
All Servant Stage productions are 'pay what you will'.

Greetings Bergstrasse Disciples,

Pastor Karen Minnich-Sadler, an interim pastor in the Lower Susquehanna Synod, creates daily meditations for her followers' edification. Nearly every day her words are spot on with what I am working through in my ministry. I share her post from June 12 (italics) alongside my reflection.

UNPREDICTABLE HOLY LOVE by Karen Minnich-Sadler At one time in our culture, church was a place of conformity, because society was also a place of conformity. People were expected to think alike and hold the same values.

Now, faith communities (unless they are more conservative or fundamentalist) who try to conform to a culture that existed in the past, are also the ones who are struggling. People confuse cultural


values with spiritual ones and see changes in culture as the enemy. Seeking to make spiritual truths relevant in a changing world is often seen as watering down the gospel.

If we believe inviting people into a faith community means inviting them to come and conform, we've missed the point of the gospel. Jesus never invited people into a rigid set of beliefs that included some but left out others. That is what made Jesus so dangerous to the really religious. He was unpredictable with his love and lavish with grace.

We, who worry so much about who is worthy and who is not, who should be included and who should be kept out, wouldn't have enjoyed journeying with Jesus. When the religiously pure used scripture to condemn others who weren't like them, Jesus spoke of God's mercy and unconditional love. Jesus pushed back human boundaries to create a welcoming and safe place for people to walk a spiritual journey, with only love of God and one another as the guiding command.

We say, yes, this is true, but...and then we pull out passages to support our inability to welcome all into the journey of transforming faith and life. Or we welcome others, but then expect them to conform to our way of understanding faith, without any possibility it might be we, ourselves, who need to be changed by the Holy Spirit of God.

The gospel was never about conformity; it was always about journey where the state of our hearts—our capacity to love as Jesus loved—is more important than any cultural value that seeks to limit God's love, a love that simply will not be contained. The call Christ places on our lives is to humbly walk this journey with others who don't believe quite as we do, and truly see them as our brothers and sisters in whom God abides, imperfections and all. Just like us.



The current Church, denominationally as well as individual congregations, struggle to unbind itself from the former model of conformity. Unlearning what has worked for generations is possible when the community is committed to being in the present. As the culture around us takes steps to be more inclusive of all people, the Church has opportunity to reactivate its voice in the way of Jesus by meeting people where they are on their life journey.

As I reflect on my past, I see where I was expected to love Jesus, rarely challenged to be like Jesus in my daily encounters with life. I was taught to see Jesus as a life figure to live up to as a model for living while at the same time hearing I could never be like Jesus because I am a sinful person. I continue to unlearn that being a sinful person is exactly where I am to be in this world. I continue to unlearn 'sin' as a specific action against another person, but as my actions against the God who loves me and all people.

It is easy to live in a world where conformity is the practice. Theoretically, conformity means everyone thinks, believes and acts the same way! How is THAT working for you! Can you imagine what the Church would look like if it were to lean into the diversity of God's people's experiences, including differing opinions on any subject? The first people who gathered after Jesus' resurrection gathered to lift each other up creating a covenant of sharing everything!

The Church today has the potential to be the voice of hope, respect difference as a gift as we serve our neighbor with love. Recently, in my time of reflection, I noticed how our knowledge of Jesus' life is just that – knowledge set apart. Can you imagine if we as faithful people were to set that knowledge into action? Faith is love in action. Being a presence that exceeds what is expected so that others are surprised, acknowledged, and loved. Let your light so shine before others.

God's gift of music



What helps you sort out what you're feeling, or experience an emotion more deeply? What allows you to let loose and cry, or fully celebrate when you're joyful? Nature helps some of us get in touch with our feelings, perhaps because it removes us from screens and other distractions.

But when getting out isn't possible — no mountain lake is nearby, or the weather isn't tranquil — consider the gift of music. Often instrumental or vocal music helps us access the depths of our soul like nothing else can. God may even speak to us through music — whether in song lyrics, our own inner thoughts or wordless stirrings of the heart.

Albert Schweitzer, a pastor, musicologist, physician and more, said, "Joy, sorrow, tears, lamentation, laughter — to all these music gives voice, but in such a way that we are transported from the world of unrest to a world of peace, and see reality in a new way, as if we were sitting by a mountain lake and contemplating hills and woods and clouds in the tranquil and fathomless water."

Make some playlists for various emotions: joy, grief, anxiety, hope. Then imagine yourself relaxing in nature, and experience God's love.

As the gospels make clear, even the Son of God needed an occasional break. For Jesus, a solitary place reached by boat served as an oasis.

Although an oasis might make us think of a beach-like vacation spot in the middle of a desert, it's simply "something that provides refuge, relief or pleasant contrast" (Merriam-Webster).

So, what's your oasis? For someone who recently lost a spouse, it could be a break from the newfound silence. For a young parent, it could be a block of solitude and silence to complete a thought.

I haven't found any definition of oasis that includes a timeframe. Such an experience could last 30 seconds or a full week. Work within your circumstances so you can get away for a time with Jesus.

As you identify and pursue an oasis, consider your answers to these questions:

- What circumstances in life cause you to desire an oasis, or break?
- What will it look like to create a personal oasis or sanctuary at home?
- When you spend time with Jesus, what do you want to do?
